## Youth SRHR programmes

Young people are often sexually active, but rarely have the legal right to freely decide on their sexuality, neither do they have access to adequate information and youth friendly health services.

Between 2011 and 2015 the Dutch SRHR Alliance implemented together with local alliances in 11 countries two innovative programmes: "Unite for Body Rights" (UFBR) and "Access, Services and Knowledge" (ASK). The philosophy of the programmes is like a tripod: improvements in the SRHR of young people can best be achieved by working simultaneously on linking SRHR education and information to youth-friendly services while creating an enabling environment: in communities, at national and international level.

The two programmes reached almost 116 million people with large scale campaigning of SRHR messages. Through more than 400,000 youth-led community activities, youth voiced their needs and rights to increase support for young people's SRHR. Seven country alliances contributed to positive changes in SRHR policies. Almost 28 million services were provided. Over 39 million contraceptive commodities were provided and almost 70,000 educators were capacitated to deliver SRHR education. Over 80,000 service providers were trained in provision of (youth friendly) services, including more than 1,000 on safe abortion.
